2. CHANGES IN JOURNALISM: FROM DISRUPTION TO REINVENTING THE NEWS

March 19, 26, April 2, 9 (Tuesdays) 1:30-3:30 pm

Over the past decade, more than 2,000 weekly and daily newspapers nationwide have closed. Thousands of others have turned into "ghost papers" – newspapers with few or no reporters. In fact, editorial staff nationwide at newspapers have been reduced by nearly two-thirds and the evidence of the cuts in staff is clear in central Illinois.

Based on the book *Changing Models for Journalism*, this course will recount what has happened to American journalism in the 21st Century but quickly move to how news is being reinvented by independent journalists, how technology and open data are being used for better journalism and how to find newsrooms and journalists you can trust. Learn ways to keep up with constant changes in news.

Recall of new information may begin to decline as early as the sixth decade of life even though intelligence and problem solving remain as strong as ever into advanced age. However, aging is the single greatest risk factor for developing many of the neurocognitive disorders. What are the best ways to identify a potentially serious problem and then finding the best resources for treating a temporary problem or diagnosing and managing a chronic condition?

Illinois and Michigan Canal Tour: A Journey Back in Time

Wednesday, May 15 | 7:30 am - 6:00 pm

The opening of the Illinois and Michigan (I&M) Canal had a profound impact on 19th century travel, commerce, westward expansion, industrial development and the growth of Chicago and other cities in Illinois. Learn of this rich history on a canal boat ride and visit to the I&M Visitor Center, Later travel to the Starved Rock locks to see how the locks accommodate barges today. Compare the 19th century canal experience with the modern lock and dam during a visit to the Illinois Waterway Visitors Center. Learn about contemporary Illinois waterway traffic and the modern lock and dam, operated by the US Army Corps of Engineers. Enjoy a stop at the Hegeler Carus Mansion in LaSalle. Discover Julius Hegeler's ties to shipping via the I&M Canal. The home was designed by architect W. W. Boyington, who also designed the Chicago Water Tower. Two rooms have been restored and many of the fine architectural details are visible in their original state.

Tricia Kelly will join us for the day, acting as the wife of a 19th century canal boat captain.

She earlier served as U.S. Ambassador to Chad and Djibouti as well as Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary in the Bureau of African Affairs, leading a team that developed and advanced U.S. policy in Africa.

ISU DIGS: THE NORTHWEST BOLSENA ARCHAEOLOGICAL PROJECT April 5

Learn about the Northwest Bolsena Archaeological Project, an ISU-based interdisciplinary research project and field school focused on the Roman site of Valle Gianni, Italy, and its surrounding landscape. The site is characterized by two primary features: the partially exposed remains of a Roman imperial period monumental fountain, possibly a nymphaeum, and an agricultural zone containing recessed vats, suggesting wine production, predating the fountain. Gain insight into two years of excavation, exciting discoveries that have been made and future plans.
